“Dear friends in Christ, every year at the time of the Christian Passover we celebrate our redemption through the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Lent is a time to prepare for this celebration and to renew our life in the paschal mystery. We begin this holy season by remembering our need for repentance, and for the mercy and forgiveness proclaimed in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

We begin our journey to Easter with the sign of ashes, an ancient sign, speaking of the frailty and uncertainty of human life, and marking the penitence of the community as a whole.

I invite you therefore, in the name of the Lord, to observe a holy Lent by self-examination, penitence, prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, and by reading and meditating on the word of God.”

– *from the Ash Wednesday Liturgy in The Book of Alternative Services*

The busyness of day-to-day commitments and the structure of our days can reduce our Lenten observance from what we would like to build into our prayer life. Lent is about making space in our lives by consecrating (literally setting aside) periods of time for practicing our faith.

One of the things I recently learned was that, in the creation story in Genesis, all things were seen as good by God, but only time was pronounced as holy. “*So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation*” Genesis 2:3.

Amidst the noise and haste, may you find space and time to live out your faith in the restful and quiet bosom of God. May your Lenten fast be filled with the peace of God which passes all understanding.

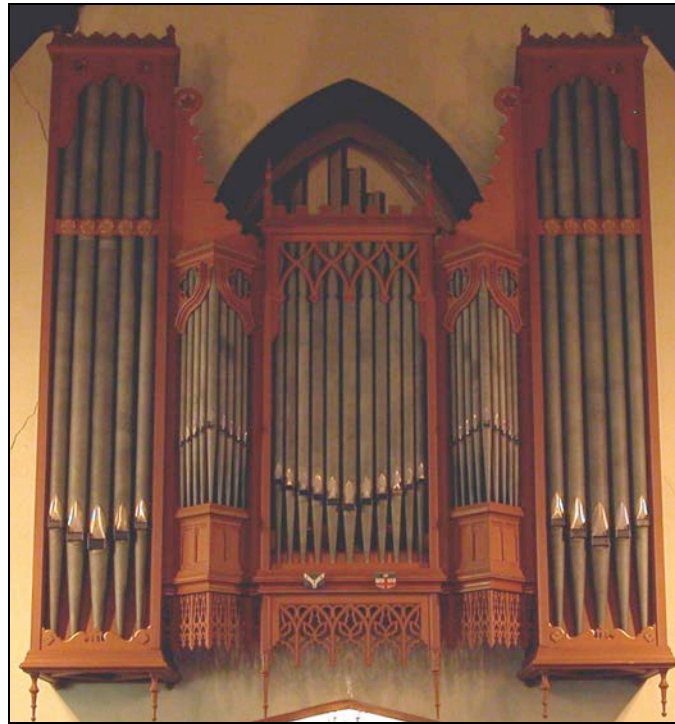
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### **Building Update**

On behalf of the Parish, I wish to express my thanks to one of our member families who have made it possible for us to engage the engineering firms of Crosier Kilgour & Partners Ltd. and Boge & Boge Ltd. Their job is to review past engineering reports, inspect the entire building and help us prioritize the areas of work which need to be done on the Church. We are at a very preliminary stage of this. Engineers from Crozier Kilgour were at the Church twice in February, and Boge and Boge engineers are due to make a preliminary inspection just after the Winged Ox goes to press.

Some preliminary work has been done on the West Organ Case. The area has been inspected, and, although there are no immediate safety issues, work does need to be done to better secure the unit for the long term.

### **St Luke's Haiti Ministry**

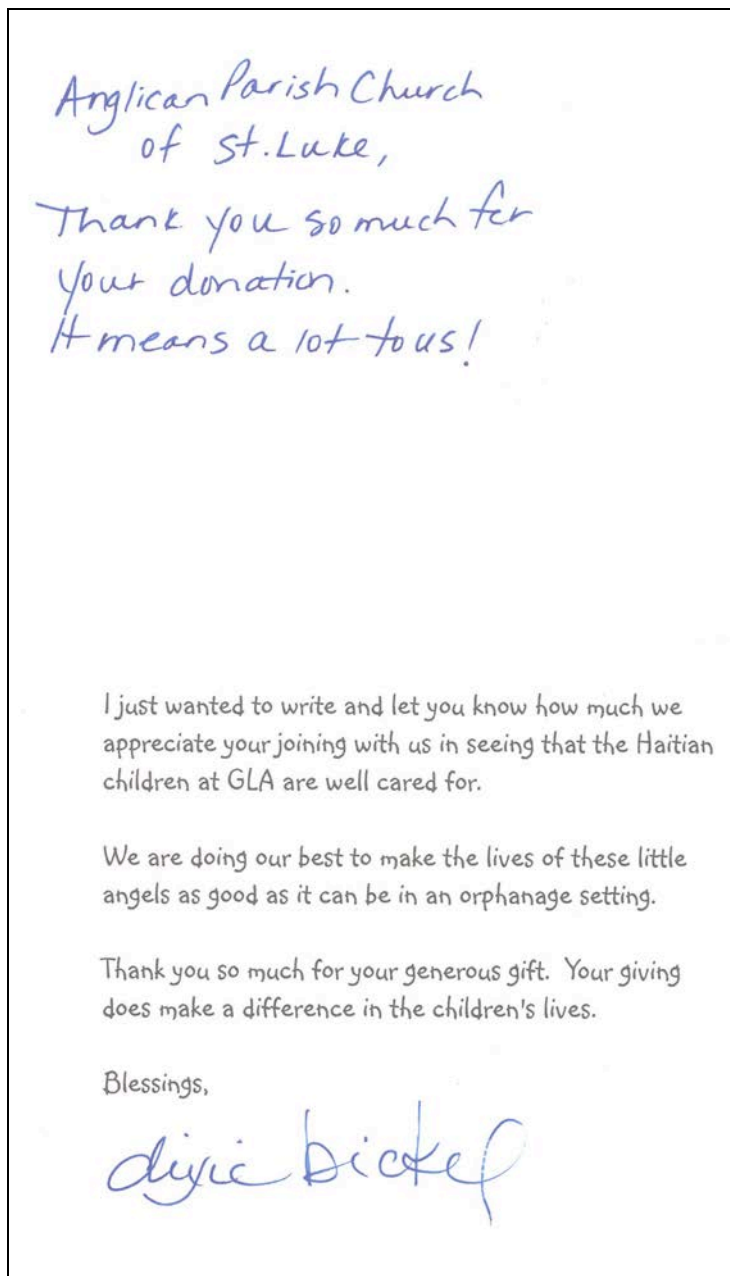
A great 'Thank You' to everyone who kindly helped us with our goal for Educating Students in Haiti, 2011-2012. We are grateful to those who contributed and supported the 'Bring and Buy Sale', and to everyone who kindly made donations. We now have sufficient funds to send our five students to school in September for another academic year.

Early in January, we received a card from Dixie Bickel, the Director of God's Littlest Angels in Haiti, personally thanking the parish for our contribution. It was a very kind gesture, especially as she has many duties to perform. We were one of the early supporters, and Dixie does not forget our parish. The envelope has three colourful Haitian stamps which we will pass onto the stamp club.

I sent a message to Dixie Bickel in Haiti this month, and asked her to encourage our students to work hard, as their funding was secure for the next academic year. Again Dixie replied to my message and thanked the parishioners of St. Luke's for all their many kindnesses.

A parish family has elected to educate a Haitian student next year. I asked Dixie if it were possible for a young female student to be allocated to our St. Luke's family, and, to our delight, Dixie has approved this request, so, as a parish, we will be educating six students in the next academic year.

Our fund raising season for 2011-2012 will begin in September and October as we have lots of fresh produce from the garden. We will have a major fund-raising event at the end of January to raise funds for the following school year. We send a cheque to God's Littlest Angels - Canada in the summer months. Glen Thanner, the President of God's Littlest Angels, Canada, is scheduled to visit St. Luke's at the end of January, 2012. We will host his visit to Winnipeg, and he plans to arrange other presentations in Winnipeg and possibly Steinbach.

## Catechesis of the Good Shepherd: a dream for our children

We have a dream for the children of St. Luke's: a dream to create for them a special space and a set of physical materials that will engage their hearts and minds in building a relationship with God (in the Church) that will last a lifetime. This dream is called the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd.

Those who were at the Annual General Meeting had an opportunity to get a glimpse of what this would look like, thanks to materials borrowed from St. Peter's Church, including a prayer table, a miniature altar, an upper room of the Last Supper, articles of the Eucharist, mini-chasubles, and, of course, a sheepfold with the Good Shepherd and his flock.

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd answers the longing of children to "help me come closer to God by myself." The materials we displayed (and others) put the words of the Bible and the actions and words of our common prayers directly into the children's hands. Children can then return to them over and over again, pondering and living with the words and actions that their hearts most need to receive.

Arriving at this vision is a process, not all of which is immediately clear. We have a current structure for Sunday school and a group of committed people whose offerings we appreciate immensely, and whose input will help guide the process. However, the parish has already made some steps.

Training of catechists is the first need, and requires a big time commitment. St. Luke's has several assets: Pamela Whyte and I are already trained catechists; Fr. Paul and Jan Paukovic have also begun being trained. Thank you, Jan, for giving your time. The vestry committed funds to support Jan's training. Thank to them, as well. And we also have men willing, not only to build the wooden materials, but to train our young people in the skills to do so: Neil Almdal has already offered his services. Thank you, again! Without these materials we cannot do this work.

We are still calling on parish support. Materials-making requires many skills. If you are willing to help sew, paint, or create clay figures, we can use your help. We also need shelving to house materials, and small trays, pitchers and pretty boxes and containers. Please be on the lookout! ## **PWRDF**

Recently, we had a wonderful weekend with Adele Finney, Executive Director of PWRDF. Adele was made full-time Director, January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2011, after being Interim for about 9 months. She comes to the post with many years of association with the Primate's Fund in a variety of positions and volunteer relationships. Her passion and care are deep and abiding. During her time with us, we were informed, inspired, and affirmed in the work of the Primate's Fund.

Deanery Celebration on Friday When you take musicians who just love to play or sing, and add baking, with a sprinkling of education from a special visitor like Adele Finney, and then up the ante with a dessert auction... the result is lots of fun and laughter!

The Forks-Seine Deanery Celebration in Rupert's Land on Friday, Feb. 4<sup>th</sup>, was just one of those evenings. Each of the 10 parishes in the Deanery offered music, and it was all excellent. The entrance requirement was a pot luck dessert, which was added to the cash bar, tea, or coffee. Then, special desserts were designated to be auctioned off for the fundraising part. Everyone got into the game and the prices just soared! A total of \$615.00 was raised for PWRDF.

Adele's presence and presentation reminded us all of other communities in Canada and around the world, our partners in development and fellowship, who seek to grow and play together as we do. Truly pray, act, and give!

### Workshop on Saturday

St. George's, Crescentwood, hosted the Parish Partners and others for a workshop. Adele challenged us to look at the partnerships we form around our own parishes, with other organizations that do similar work, (such as MCIC), and to recognize that the projects overseas are on-the-ground partnerships. They grow from local need, and the people who do the work are often a few strong leaders who inspire others around them. Partnership with the Primate's Fund often begins because the village is in a remote place in a country severely damaged by war or natural disaster.

One such project which she used to illustrate this is in Mozambique. After years of civil war, the northern part of Mozambique was very cut off from supplies and support. What they wanted was a place for people with HIV/AIDS to go to die with dignity. What they found was that after Temba House was built, the love, physical care and nourishment they gave meant that many recovered. These people were taught how to care for others, and some returned to even smaller villages to do this. Today, Temba House sends 3 out of 4 out, to live well. They have cut through the isolation and shame and addressed the basic needs of these people.

By using the analogy to "edge habitat" (In agriculture, there are farms next to forests, and between them is an edge habitat. Or, at the edge of the road between traffic and field, there is another. In these environments live more species than in either of the other two habitats, but they are vulnerable. There is often a lot of violence, but they also offer gifts of snow fence, or transition planting of fruited hedgerows.) Adele helped us to see that around many of our churches is another edge habitat of vulnerable, hurting people. In big cities there is frequently a community of wealth right next door to poverty, immigration and marginalized people. The Parish struggles to serve both. But, just as in nature, there is a protection or a richness in the transition. Are we prepared to look for these? Are we open to receive the gifts we are given?

Adele asked us what questions we would ask, if we were to go out into our neighbourhoods to look at projects. How do we tell the difference between charity and partnership? Some of the questions we asked were: Where did the need for the project come from? Whose idea was it? Is it self-sustainable? Is there a better way? Who are the workers? Does it include all the members of society – young and old, men and women, able and disabled?

### Worship with St. Stephen's:

In her sermon, where Adele likened PWRDF to the door between our communities on the one side and other communities around the world (yes, in Canada, too) as the other hand, she used those questions to explain how projects are selected and nurtured.

To achieve the newly accepted vision for PWRDF, *a truly just, healthy and peaceful world*, Adele reminded us to pray, act, and give.

At one stage in her time at the Primate's fund, the then Executive Director was dying, but asked for prayers for Sudan. It takes time, but there is a fragile hope in Sudan. There is a need for us all to act. Does your Parish have a Parish Partner to help keep you connected to the work? Could you be that person? And give. Yes, if each Anglican gave \$10.00/year, there would be no need to do a campaign for the development arm of our work. Natural disasters are different.

The Mission: "As an instrument of faith, PWRDF connects Anglicans in Canada to communities around the world in dynamic partnerships to advance development, respond to emergencies, assist refugees and act for positive change." You belong here.

## Roof Repairs

What were those men doing on the church roof in November?

As most are probably aware, the church has had, over the past several years, problems with water leaking from the ceiling or down the walls in many areas. You have probably noticed the pails outside the Rector's Study, or the pool of water on the floor in Church House, or heard about the water that got into the organ pipes.

The men on the roof were our attempt to solve some of these problems. Vestry authorized the hiring of Lance Roofing to repair the most significant problem water penetration areas identified by the consultant, D K Bennett. The church obtained a grant from Heritage Manitoba that was to be matched by the Parish; however, when the final estimate was obtained the grant has covered only about one-quarter of the cost.

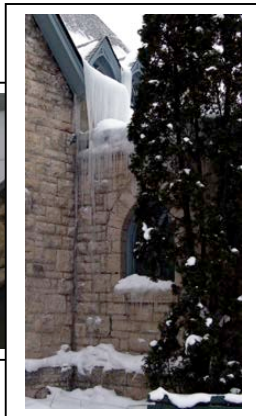
Unfortunately, the roofers have uncovered some consequences of our reluctance to do routine maintenance; you can see, for example, the weathering effects on wood surfaces of the tower, sphere, and windows. As well, in spite of the work done, the early snow and cold weather has revealed an icing problem, principally above the Stradbrook entrance and the Stradbrook dormers over the Chancel on the south side, similar to what many of us are experiencing with our homes.

Publisher: McArthur and Company

Lynne and Ralph are an English couple, comfortably well off with two adult children, Nathalie and David, both of whom are adopted, married and with families of their own. Both Nathalie and David have always assured their parents, and each other, that being adopted did not really matter. However, Nathalie decides she needs to know the identity of her birth parents, and insists that David join her to search for his.

In due course, both are successful in their search, and meet their birth mothers, only to discover that this leads to much soul searching, and also creates many problems for all concerned.

The author does manage to collect the 'loose ends' into a very interesting conclusion. Perhaps not one that the reader was expecting.

A 12-year-old girl drowns in a South Carolina river. The body is trapped, and cannot be retrieved by conventional methods. Naturally, the parents want the recovery of the body, but the residents of the town of Tamasee, which is also the name of the river, are afraid that the recovery try will endanger, not only the natural beauty of the area, but also the river itself.

In the middle of this furor, is Maggie Glenn, a former resident of the town, who is a newspaper photographer assigned to cover the recovery story. She knows the local people involved, and her feelings are mixed. Should an all-out effort be tried to raise the body, or should the wishes of the local environmentalists be granted.

Maggie is also torn between her feelings and the feelings of a fellow newsman, Allan Hemphill, who himself is recovering from a tragic loss of his own. The story climaxes and then ends with yet another tragedy.
